

# The Jane Austen Book Club:

Emma
Recommended for Adults

### **Background:**

Jane Austen: Born in 1775, Jane Austen was ahead of her time, though largely unknown, during her life. Austen's comic romance novels gained popularity in the 20th century due to her descriptions of everyday life of the Georgian-era middle class. Using a pseudonym, Jane Austen published four novels: *Sense and Sensibility, Pride and Prejudice, Mansfield Park,* and *Emma*. Yet, it was not until after her death in 1816 that her family revealed her as the author. Over time, Jane Austen's novels have become classics that continue to shape and influence pop culture to this day.

*Emma*: Twenty-one-year-old Emma Woodhouse comfortably dominates the social order in the village of Highbury, convinced that she has both the understanding and the right to manage other people's lives—for their own good, of course. Her well-meant interfering centers on the aloof Jane Fairfax, the dangerously-attractive Frank Churchill, the foolish, if appealing, Harriet Smith, and the ambitious young vicar Mr. Elton, and ends with her complacency shattered, her mind awakened to some of life's more intractable dilemmas, and her happiness assured.
