Undesign the Redline Exhibit Opens at LA County Library

The exhibit, brought to LA County Library by Enterprise Community Partners will be on display at A C Bilbrew Library from October 19 through December 2019

LA County Library is hosting an opening reception for Undesign the Redline exhibit by Enterprise Community Partners at A C Bilbrew Library on Saturday, October 19 at 1 pm. The display will remain at the library through December 2019.

The interactive exhibit connects the history of housing discrimination and segregation to the political and social issues of today. Featuring maps, a timeline and stories, the stimulating space seeks to give visitors a better understanding of Redlining, it's link to the problems of today and how the narrative can be changed in the future.

"We are always excited when we have an opportunity to share important history that still impacts us today with our customers," said LA County Library Director Skye Patrick. "The Undesign the Redline highlights how policy can continue to divide communities and is a great fit to be displayed at an LA County Library location with a dedicated cultural resource center like A C Bilbrew Library.
