



Kōwhaiwhai Pattern Bookmarks

Recommended for Ages 8 – 12

The Māori are the native Polynesian people of New Zealand. The Māori people's long history originated when they arrived in New Zealand in the early- to mid-1300s. Hundreds of years later, the Māori culture, rich with arts and tradition, is still a big part of New Zealand's identity. One of those artistic traditions is Kōwhaiwhai. Consisting of repeating scroll patterns, this decorative art form adorns house rafters and can either be painted or carved into wood. Kōwhaiwhai are often found on Māori meeting houses.
