What is LA vs HATE?

LA vs Hate is a program of the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations, one of the oldest civil rights organizations in the nation. LA vs Hate a community-driven approach to empower all residents of Los Angeles County to unite against, report, and resist hate. LA vs Hate also supports people and communities as they heal from the trauma of hate.

We are inspiring you to stand up to hate, build an understanding about what constitutes hate, and learn how to report hate to 211LA.

What is bias?

The belief that some people or ideas are better than others that usually results in treating people unfairly.

What is hate?

Hate is a hostile expression or action motivated by bias against a person's actual or perceived identity(ies).

Common expressions of hate:

- + Ableism Hatred because of mental and/or physical differences
- + Ageism Hatred because of age targeting young people and elders
- + Anti-Semitism Hatred targeting Jews
- + Classism Hatred because of financial resources targeting poor people
- + Heterosexism Hatred because of nonconformity to heterosexuality
- + Homophobia Hatred because of gay, lesbian, or bisexual identity
- + Islamophobia Hatred targeting Muslims
- + Racism Hatred targeting "people of color:" African-Americans, Latina/ os, Asian-Americans, Native Americans
- + Sexism Hatred targeting women
- + Xenophobia Hatred targeting immigrants

Examples of hate include:

- + Name-calling or insults
- + Bullying or cyberbullying
- + Distribution of materials with hate messages in public places
- + Posting hate material that does not result in property damage

Why should you report hate?

By tracking and reporting hate, we can ensure that resources are allocated appropriately, that those targeted by hate receive the support they need, and that together we can build respectful and resilient communities.

If you have been the victim of hate or bullying, LA vs Hate will support you.

Explore Justice is an online video series that LA vs Hate designed to help unpack and examine the current and historical perspectives that shape social justice. What is: Social Justice

From this video, you can learn how everyone's life experiences may be different from one another and how it's important to amplify and empower others whenever possible.





What is: Culture?

Culture looks different for each of us. This video identifies the symbols, values/beliefs, and norms that make up culture and how it influences our everyday life.





What is: Privilege & Oppression?

This video defines privilege and oppression and how they innately co-exist. You will hear about the types of privilege; earned and unearned, and how someone can experience both privilege and oppression simultaneously.





What is: Patriarchy?

This video defines the patriarchy and how it has shaped our lives, family structures, institutions including government, and work environments.





Billy Porter Gives A Brief History of Queer Political Action

This video shares significant moments in queer history, starting with the birth of the first gay rights organization in America in the 1920s and gives name to some of the most significant leaders in gay rights activism.





History of Native California

Learn the history of California through its first residents, the indigenous community. You will be introduced to the colonization cycle, the mission system, and the forced assimilation of the native people, along with how descendants are now sharing their ancestral knowledge through Native Studies programs.



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


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




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









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

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
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
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How To Be a (Young) Antiracist

by Irbam X Kendi and Nic Stone



Continue learning at Explore Justice, an online video series designed to help unpack and examine the current and historical perspectives that shape social justice. Dig deeper into the topic areas below that are most relevant to you.

Explore Justice covers three content areas:

- Racial Justice explores institutional racism, specifically the historical context that perpetuates it, and how we can pursue racial equity through systems change.
- Gender Justice is the idea that people of all genders deserve equal access to power,opportunities, and resources regardless of their biological sex or gender identity.
- Cultural Equity is the concept that there exists a dominant narrative about society, theperception of groups of people within that society, and that these enabled structural oppression to exist and that we must strive to change it.
