Recommended for Teens Ages 13 - 17



A Land Acknowledgement is a formal statement that recognizes indigenous peoples as the traditional stewards of the land we live on and respects the important and long-standing relationship between people, culture, and land. Land Acknowledgements are a way to express gratitude and appreciation for the people who have been living and working on the land for thousands of years and continue to do so today. Land acknowledgements are not only about the history of the land, but also help us to recognize the impact of ongoing colonialism and the historical relevance of our participation in it.
